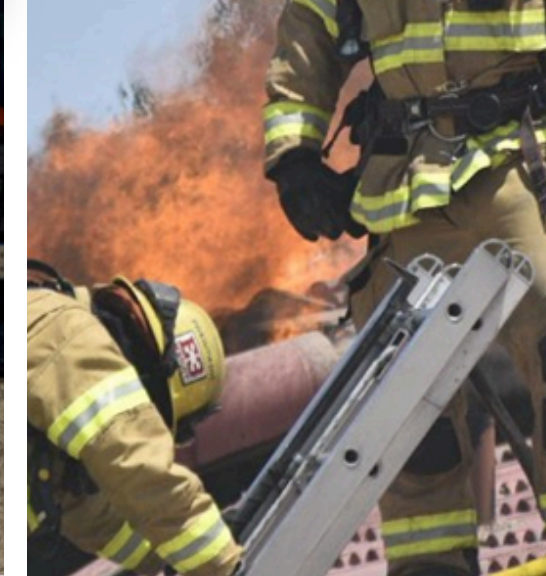
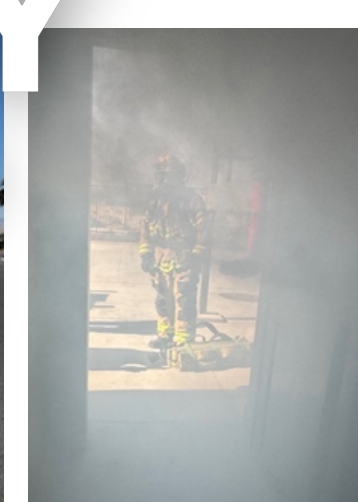




# MONTHLY REPORT JUNE 2025



# June Re-Cap

## Monthly Summary







June 2025 was a milestone-filled month for Cathedral City Fire & EMS, showcasing a strong commitment to operational excellence, leadership development, and community outreach. With the successful completion of the Fire Recruit Academy, final preparations for placing Medic 22 in service, and multiple promotions within the department, June reflected the continued momentum of Measure W implementation.

Throughout the month, the department responded to 658 emergency service calls, including 408 EMS incidents with 322 billable transports and 15 fire-related calls. Personnel accumulated over 1,170 training hours, with significant time dedicated to live fire drills at the Roy Wilson Training Center and onboarding of new recruits.

From regional collaboration to fire prevention efforts and continued investment in wellness and infrastructure, CCFE remains dedicated to delivering exceptional public safety services rooted in integrity and community trust.



# Key Achievements

-  **Medic 22 Academy Completed** – Recruit class graduated in June; Medic 22 goes in-service July 1.
-  **Promotions** – Chris Dietz promoted to Fire Captain; Joe Richardson to Fire Engineer.
-  **Firefighter Swearing-In** – Four new hires joined the department, enhancing capacity.
-  **Cadet Progress** – Cadets received PPE and began engine ride-alongs.
-  **ISO Evaluation** – CCFE completed ISO re-grading assessment with Verisk.
-  **Fall Prevention Outreach** – Successful senior center event to reduce emergency falls.
-  **Significant Fires** – Two-alarm fire displaced 11 residents; swift mutual aid response.
-  **Wellness Site Visit** – Staff traveled to Oxnard to evaluate firefighter health vendor.

# Mutual Aid & Major Incidents

## Significant Fires

- **Structure Fires:** June 11 (Wednesday) – Dual structure fires, one escalated to a 3-alarm incident on Sky Blue Water Drive, impacting three homes and displacing 11 residents. Coordination included 7 CCFE units and 12 mutual aid apparatus from Palm Springs Fire and Riverside County Fire.
- **Vehicle Fires:** Burrtec trash truck fire; contained without injuries or damage to nearby structures.
- **Other Fires:** Multiple smaller incidents including trash fires, cooking-related fires, and vegetation fires were logged throughout June.

# Fire Prevention

## Fire Prevention

- 119 inspections passed out of 140 conducted in June.
- Reviewed fire protection plans for:
  - Blue Fern Development (2,491 residential units)
  - Verano, The Cove Project, and Foothill Cove (60 units)
  - Kings School Renovation, Dutch Bros CO<sub>2</sub> System
- Hydrant flow tests conducted for ISO grading.
- Business licenses approved for Perez Gardens, Midnight Esthetics, and others.





# Community Risk Reduction & Community Engagement

- Cadet Program Advancement – Cadets were issued fire helmets and Nomex jackets to begin safe ride-alongs on fire engines, marking a major milestone in hands-on development.
- Fall Prevention Class – A well-attended event at the Senior Center provided older adults with education on home safety and mobility, improving quality of life and reducing fall-related emergencies.
- Fireworks Awareness Campaign – “No Fireworks” decals were added to fire fleet vehicles as part of the citywide outreach ahead of Independence Day.
- College of the Desert Partnership – Department leadership participated in the COD Paramedic Advisory Committee, ensuring CCFE helps shape the future of regional EMS education.
- Emergency Preparedness Planning – Local Hazard Mitigation Plan submitted to Cal OES for review; Emergency Operations Plan finalized with training scheduled for department heads.
- Roy Wilson Training Center Activation – Firefighters trained in realistic live-fire environments, improving safety, readiness, and operational capability.

# Recruitment & Staffing

- Four firefighters officially onboarded June 16.
- Two key promotions: Fire Captain (Chris Dietz) and Fire Engineer (Joe Richardson).
- Fire Academy class graduated June 26.
- Medic 22 scheduled for service beginning July 1 at Fire Station 2.



# Leadership Development & Training

## Leadership Development

- Fire Executive Team Meeting focused on operational alignment and decision-making.
- Chief Contreras and BCs held leadership roundtables on fireground tactics.
- Emergency Operations Plan finalized; LHMP submitted to Cal OES and pending FEMA review.
- Total of 1,170+ hours of training logged across EMS, suppression, and wellness.





# Training & Professional Dev.

## Monthly Total Training Hours

Over the course of June 2025, Cathedral City Fire & EMS personnel accumulated a combined 1,455.75 training hours. These hours were dedicated to refining EMS operations, fire suppression tactics, apparatus operations, and community risk reduction.
